Grampians Wimmera Tour

Day 1: Leave Melbourne and travel to inspect the various sites of the Woorndoo Grassland Native Restoration Program. Overnight Hamilton.

Day 2: Visit the large extensive Myer garden which surrounds two lakes and is rarely open to the public. A short stroll through open forest of heathland, Hakea, Grevillea and Banksia and a visit to the Piccaninny Walk, Grampians and the Mt William Summit car park to see some of the higher altitude plants of the Grampians. Overnight Halls Gap.





Day 3: Wildlife Art Museum Australia (WAMA) to see the garden of the many endemic plants of the Grampians. Visit two private gardens, one is Neil and Wendy Marriott's which has a large range of Grevilleas along with many other plants. Overnight Halls Gap.





Day 4: Visit *Wartook Gardens* belonging to Jeanne and Royce Raleigh, which has one of the largest collections of Australian plants in western Victoria. Visit the Horsham Church of Christ garden and another private garden bordering Burnt Creek, Horsham. Overnight Horsham.

Day 5: Mt Arapiles and the Little Desert. Overnight Horsham.





Day 6: Travel back to Melbourne stopping at the Deep Lead Nature Conservation Reserve and the Stawell Ironbarks.

Great Ocean Road Otways Tour

Day 1: Leave Melbourne and travel to the Kevin Hoffman Walk, Lara. Explore Point Addis and the coastal heathlands. Overnight Anglesea.

Day 2: Visit Peter Shaw's award winning *Sunnymeade Garden* and the renowned Anglesea Heathlands. Overnight Anglesea.





Day 3: 'Great Ocean Walk' Lorne, Koala walk Kennett River and the Grey River Rainforest walk. Overnight Apollo Bay.

Day 4: Great Ocean Road to the Otways, Maits Rest, Port Campbell. Coastal scenery and heathlands of the Bay of Islands. Overnight Warrnambool.

Gippsland and Wilsons Promontory Tour

Day 1: Leave Melbourne and travel towards Wonthaggi via Tooradin and The Gurdies, the Desalination Plant, Dalyston and an afternoon walk in the Wonthaggi Heathlands. Coastal walk at Eagles Nest. Overnight Inverloch.

Day 2: Garden visit to Paul and Jenny Sierakowski, Inverloch, Celia Rosser Gallery at Fish Creek and onto Foster and the New Zealand Hill conservation reserve. After Dinner speaker, Dr Mary Ellis. Overnight Foster.





Day 3: Toora Bird Hide walk then to Wilsons Promontory National Park with two walks in morning, Darby River, Lilly Pilly Gully and airstrip. After Dinner speaker, Rohan Bugg. Overnight Foster.

Day 4: Port Franklin walk then to Wilsons Promontory National Park, Squeaky Beach walk, Tidal River, two options for walks in the afternoon - Loo Ern walk 1km or Tidal river Overlook circuit walk, 3.8 kms. Overnight Foster.

Day 5: Port Welshpool walk, Tarra-Bulga National Park Fern Gully walk and Swing Bridge walk. Overnight Traralgon.

Day 6: Travel back to Melbourne via Traralgon Railway Reserve wetlands, Morwell National Park, Fosters Gully nature walk. Garden visit Colin and Mary Jackson, and Edward Hunter Reserve Moe.
