I trust all members had a pleasant festive season with family and friends, and hope 2004 will be a year of good health and prosperity.



ASGAP CONFERENCE

As this newsletter goes to print, the ASGAP conference will discuss a number of motions put forward which directly affect Study Groups. In general terms, the meeting will decide:

- whether or not to make a Study Group Meeting an integral part of all future conferences and if so, whether Study Group Leaders should then be subsidised to attend.

From your leaders perspective, I believe Study Groups are a fundamental aspect of ASGAP! I also know that the main contributing reason I have been unable to attend such conferences is due to the financial constraints. As such I feel that subsidising Study Group leaders to attend would probably see at least one other Study Group Leader attending the conferences and therefore promoting the Growing, Study and Conservation of Australian Plants.

- The other major issue to be addressed is accountability. It is proposed that at the end of each financial year that the Study Group Leader shall arrange for the auditing of the Study Group finances by an independent person or persons.

In principal I agree with this motion. However, I am also concerned about putting it into practice. Income of Study Groups such as ours is meager, only being derived from membership subscriptions or donations. Unless arrangements can be made for freebee auditing the proposal will consume much needed funding.

We look forward to hearing the outcomes of the conference.

TALKS

I was invited to be guest speaker at the **Illawarra branch of APS in November 2004**. The talk and slide show depicted the wide variety of habitat types that the genus *Prostanthera* occupy from cool coastal forests to exposed semi-alpine slopes. What was evident from the slides was that many *Prostanthera* in the wild are found in full sun environs. This observation contradicts the often stated cultivation requirement of the need for shady situations.

The Central Coast Group has kindly invited me to be guest speaker in March. I will present a talk and slide show with an opportunity at the end of the talk for questions. FIELD TRIPS

Brian Timmis and Steve Clemesha have undertaken a number of field trips on the North Coast and Northern Tablelands of NSW over the last six months.

In October Brian had a trip to observe the habitat of a number of *Prostanthera* species. Along the Gwyder Highway he observed two species of mints in the Gibraltar Range National Park. One species, *Prostanthera ovalifolia* sens lat., grew to over 6 metres and the other is closely related to the Victorian taxon *Prostanthera mellissifolia*.

In the Mulligans Hut vicinity of the Gibraltar NP, grow three species of mints: *Prostanthera ovalifolia* sens lat., *P. scutellarioides* sens. lat. and *P. saxicola* var. *major*.

In the nearby Washpool National Park, Brian observed *Prostanthera* unamed sp. (No.18 UNE) resprouting from the roots after a wildfire swept through the area the previous year.

In the Torrington area, west of Tenterfield, Brian observed *P. staurophylla* and *P. nivea* var. *nivea* growing on granite outcroppings. At Bonoo Bonoo he observed *P. sp B* at two localities along with *P. nivea* var *nivea*.

Mintbushes of Mount Warning— Northern NSW

The following is an extract of a letter by Steve Clemesha December 2003.

I went to the top of Mt Warning. My legs were a bit stiff from a lot of walking the day before so I went up at a fairly leisurely pace . You first pass through an area of subtropical rainforest. Near the half way sign you enter into moist eucalyptus forest. Soon after this zone started I observed a patch of 20-30 Prostanthera ovalifolia sens. lat.

After that there is no more mints until you reach the base of the steep rocky section. This population occurs around the base of the rocky part and all the way up to the top. The steep slopes only have about 5 species of plants (shrubs) including the mintbush. As I walked up a few young guys passed me. When I got to the top one of them said "Oh ! You made it". It was the 5th time I have been up Mount Warning and it was the first time it was clear. I was rather hopeful of something special growing on the steep slopes as it gets a lot of fog (Wollumbin means cloud catcher) but Prostanthera ovalifolia sens lat. was the only mint on the mountain.

The two populations of Prostanthera ovalifolia are probably the same form but the leaves differ because the ones near the halfway mark are in a fairly sheltered habitat while the ones at the top are very exposed but also get a lot of fog.

want to know

"what plant is that?"

Its easy!

For plant identification send as complete a specimen as possible - preferably fresh; including material suitable for cuttings. These can be wrapped loosely, in lightly dampened absorbent paper enclosed within a milk carton. Prior notice by phone is advisable before dispatch via overnight post. Alternatively, a dried specimen can be posted between sheets of stiff card. In both cases, origin details, size and features such as flower colour should be included.
